Questions and Answers

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Course Description

We will study the semantics and pragmatics of questions and answers. Topics include: major compositional semantic approaches to questions, the "goodness" and relevance of answers to a given question, exhaustivity, NPI-licensing, explicit and implicit questions in discourse, intonation and information structure, topics at the syntax-semantics interface. We will discuss classic papers and more recent research. Students are encouraged to explore related areas, such as cross-linguistic, computational or psycholinguistic aspects of the topic.

Prerequisites: Graduate status or permission of the instructor.

Teaching method: Lectures, student presentations, and discussions.

Readings: Selected readings from the primary literature.

Evaluation: Completion of readings, regular attendance and involvment in discussions are expected of all participants. All students are expected to present at least one of the readings in class. In addition, students taking the course for credit are required to write a paper on a topic of their choice, for which they must have my approval by the end of October. The paper is due on Monday, Dec 06. Late papers will not be accepted unless prior approval is given.
